**FUNERAL OF FATHER O'CONNOR**

Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D. D. Officiates at Pontifical Requiem Mass.

Many Attend the Observance at the Cathedral.

Rev. James O'Connor, for sixteen years pastor of St. Bridget's Church, died Sunday morning at St. Mary's Hospital, after an illness of more than a year, aged 65 years.

Father O'Connor was born at Scottsville, April 9, 1844, and received his early education in the public schools of that village. Later he entered what is now known as Niagara University, where he prepared for the priesthood. He was ordained in Buffalo in 1867 by Bishop Timon and was assigned to St. Mary's Church in that city. Later he was sent to Weedsport and then to Ovid and in the early 80's came to St. Bridget's Church to take charge of the work here. He served for sixteen years and in February, 1891, took up his duties at St. Patrick's Church at Seneca Falls, his last charge. Father O'Connor organized the C. M. B. A. in this city and in 1890 organized the first local branch of the L. C. B. A. In 1896 he made a trip to the Holy Land, with a view to recuperating his failing health, and after his return he again took up his active duties. Entirely broken in health, about a year ago he was taken to St. Mary's Hospital where he remained until the end came peacefully.

He leaves three sisters, Mrs. B. A. Myles of Philadelphia, Mrs. Julia Walsh and Miss Mary A. O'Connor, and a brother, John O'Connor of this city.

The funeral was held at 10 o'clock Thursday morning from the Cathedral. The church was thronged by his former parishioners, who loved him because of his sterling character and unselfish disposition.

The bishop officiated at pontifical requiem mass, assisted by Very Rev. D. J. Curran, V. G., assistant priest; Rev. John J. Donnelly, Victor, and Rev. William H. McDonald, General, deacons of honor; Rev. John Neilligan, Aurora, deacon of the mass; Rev. Michael Dwyer, Seneca Falls, sub-deacon; Rev. Patrick Gilman, Buffalo, and Rev. Owen Farron, Avon, acolytes; Rev. Arthur O'Connor, Brooklyn, censor bearer; Rev. George Jones, Seneca, candle bearer; Rev. Stephen Byrne, Auburn, book bearer; Rev. John B. Sullivan, Corpus Christi Church, miter bearer; Rev. J. F. Goggin, St. Bernard's Seminary, master of ceremonies.

The bearers were: Rev. Richard Story, Brockport; Rev. Louis A. Lambert, Scottsville; Rev. Simon Fitzsimons, Lima; Rev. D. W. Kavanaugh, St. Bridget's; Rev. Michael Madden, Phelps; Rev. William H. Harrington, M. R., Ithaca. The choral parts of the mass were chanted by the priests under the direction of Rev. John M. Peter. A large number of the priests escorted the body to the grave in Holy Sepulchre, where the bishop officiated at the solemn services of commitment. Interment was made in the plot alongside the chapel reserved for priests.
