TO DEDICATE NEW POLISH CHURCH.

Two Bishops WILL Celebrate Mass at St. Stanislaus'.

St. Stanislaus' Church in Hudson Avenue will be dedicated on Sunday, August 1st. It is a cause of regret to the parish that the rector, Rev. Theophilus Szadlinski is seriously ill and will not be able to take part in the dedication services.

Bishop Paul Rhode, auxiliary bishop to Archbishop James E. Quigley, of Chicago, and the only Polish Catholic bishop in this country, will preach and Bishop Thomas F. Hickey will conduct the ceremony, priests of the diocese assisting. The building is fast nearing completion.

At 10 o'clock solemn high mass will be celebrated. At 3 o'clock solemn vespers will be held and Rev. Alexander Peters of Buffalo, will deliver the sermon.

Red pressed brick with mediana stone foundation is the material of the new church, built in early Romanesque style. It is 166 feet long, the width of the nave is 56 feet and transept and vestries are 36 feet wide. Ten pillars of Vermont marble support the roof. A rose window will be in the front of the church and all the other windows will be of stained glass.

Catholic Summer School, Cliff Haven, N. Y., July 23.

Mr. Lytell will be seen in the role of Owen Conway originally played by Arnold Daly and Miss Evelyn Vaughan will be seen as Marled Deering, the cast side school mistress, and will make her final appearance to the many friends she has made in Rochester during her all too short engagement with the Lytell Company.
