Arch Abbot Boniface Krug, who died on July 4th of this year, and who for many years enjoyed the distinction of being Arch-Abbot of the ancient Italian Monastery at Monte Cassino and head of the Benedictine Order, was born in Hunfeld, Germany. His early studies and first vows were made in St. Vincent's, Beatty, Pa. He was a great friend of Pope Leo XIII as also of the present Holy Father. While Arch-Abbot of Monte Cassino, the German Emperor and King of Italy visited him several times, it being the first time in centuries that the latter came to the Monastery on a friendly visit. Arch-Abbot Krug came to America several times, and while in Rochester (1887 and 1897) was the guest of Bishop McQuaid at Henlock Lake and of the Redemptorist Fathers.
