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Condition of Bishop Hendrick

Report by Cable That He Has Recovered of Kidneys.

Word has been received from the auxiliary bishop of Cebu, P.I., to the effect that the condition of Bishop Thomas A. Hendrick is still considered critical and that the sick man has asked that either Monsignor Hendrick or Judge Hendrick, who are his brothers come to Cebu at once.

One of these men will leave for the Philippines on the first steamer, sailing on September 25 from New York. It will take the vessel six weeks to reach the islands.

In the cable received here, it was said that the malady from which Bishop Hendrick is suffering is a congestion of the kidneys.

Remains of Bishop Placed in Crypt

The remains of Rt. Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid, on last Friday were transferred from the temporary place of burial, where they had rested since the funeral, to the final resting place in the vault beneath the mortuary chapel in Holy Sepulchre cemetery. An artistic crypt has been constructed in which the body of the bishop is to rest. The crypt is constructed of pressed white brick and bears a metal tablet, on which are engraved the words: "In memory of Rt. Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid, D. D., who died Jan. 18, 1909. May his soul rest in peace."

The priests who had been in retreat at St. Bernard's Seminary during the week, went from the seminary to the place where the body of the bishop rested, when the remains were raised from the temporary grave. A procession was formed, headed by Bishop Hickey, who was assisted by Rev. Friedrich Laurentz and Rev. J.H. Day as deacon and sub-deacon. The priests chanted the Miserere as they moved from the grave to the chapel. The six consistory of the diocese bore the casket from the grave to the crypt. After the ceremonies of consigning the body of the bishop to his final earthly abode and the memorial services in the chapel concluded, the procession moved to the graves of the priests and nuns on the north side of the chapel, where the De Profundis was chanted.
