SOCIETY KILN, ROCHESTER FRIENDS.

Rev. Alphonse A. Notebaert, rector of Church of Our Lady of Victory, this city, has returned from the third annual meeting of the Association of Belgian and Holland Priests.



It was decided to hold meetings in the future every two years, instead of every year. The next convention will take place in Boston, in connection with the Catholic Missionary Conference of America.

Father Notebaert announces, that beginning with the last Sunday of this month, members of the Order of St. Norbert will conduct a mission in Church of Our Lady of Victory for the benefit of the Holland speaking residents of this vicinity. For the first time in the United States there will be conducted a mission for non-Catholic Hollanders.



Assemblyman Cyrus W. Phillips has been re-nominated by the Republican party in the Fourth District of Monroe County. Mr. Phillips was born in the city of Rochester in 1870 and is engaged in the practice of law in the Ellwanger and Barry Building. He is just completing his first term as member of Assembly. He is a member of the judiciary committee of the Assembly. His most conspicuous services during his term in office were those involved in the passage of the bill creating a commission to inquire into the subject of Employers Liability and the Causes of Industrial Accidents and the bill strengthening and amending the statute of 1908 requiring railroad companies to pay their employees semi-monthly.

As a result of the passage of the bill providing for an Employers Liability commission, one has been appointed and has among its members Senators, Assemblymen, manufacturers, and workmen. Mr. Phillips is a member of this commission and chairman of the committee on Causes and Prevention of Industrial Accidents. The commission is now at work and expects to report to the next legislature remedial legislation that will be highly beneficial to employers, employees and the general public.

With regard to the semi-monthly pay bill which bore his name it was introduced by him at the request of the railroad men of the state and in pursuance of a recommendation made by Governor Hughes in his annual message to the legislature. At a previous session of the legislature a semi-monthly pay bill had been passed but contained provisions rendering it unenforceable, and it was to correct these provisions that the bill was introduced by Mr. Phillips. As a result of this legislation all the railroad companies with the exception of two commenced paying their men semi-monthly.

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
