Frank X. Feery, Democratic and Independence League candidate for the Eighth Ward, was born in Irondequoit in the year 1855, worked as stonecutter until the age of 20, when his parents moved to Rochester; then worked at the grocery business, and at the age of 22 started in business at Joseph Avenue and Rauber Street, where he is still located. He is also connected with the firm of Feery & Kastner, Stone Quarriers, and they handle some real estate. Mr. Feery is a member of St. Leo's Society and St. Louis Commandary, No. 17, also commissary of Colonel Feery's staff of the Knights of St. John.

His first effort as Alderman was for the brick ordinance, that was for a better test of brick for street pavements. Then for the removal of wooden poles on Joseph Avenue and Baden Street, which have been obstacles in these streets for many years. He placed thirteen new lights, two lights were moved, and have promises for more; placed a new water hydrant on Albow Place; street improvements as follows: Edward Street, Gilmore Street, Lincoln Street, Stokes Street, and through many efforts Joseph Avenue was improved at a cost of about \$7,000 less; also the improvement of Stephany Place was done without any expense to the taxpayers, excepting the sidewalks, on account of that street being the entrance to No. 9 School Playgrounds.

Within the last two years No. 9 and No. 26 Schools were completed and an addition was made to No. 18 School; also a bath house and playground was placed at No. 9 School and said to be the finest in the city.
