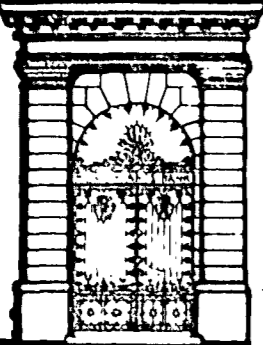

ABOUT WOMEN.

The last census of the United States shows that two-thirds of the population are women.

The United States has a population of 100,000,000. Two-thirds of this population are women. The women of America claim 5,000 branches of the women's suffrage movement.

The lack of direct political power constitutes a powerful reason why women's suffrage has been kept at a distance in our country. It is a matter of fact that women are not allowed to vote in any of the states.

In Austria, where women vote, the husband is not allowed to vote. This is a very interesting fact. It shows that women's suffrage is not a matter of course.

Their idea of married life is not a household but of luxury and ease."

Dr. W. B. Riley, a Baptist minister of Minneapolis, also said that there was a strong disposition on the part of women not to bear children because it interfered with their social and commercial affairs in life.

"Women," he said, "are becoming more independent owing to the number of lucrative positions open to them, consequently they do not want to saddle themselves with the duties of family life that are inseparable from matrimony. The independence of women is growing among women and it is hard to say what will be the result of it all. It certainly is a serious matter. Marriage in proportion to the population is on the decline and while many women are willing to be married they do not wish to be mothers. The situation is appalling."
