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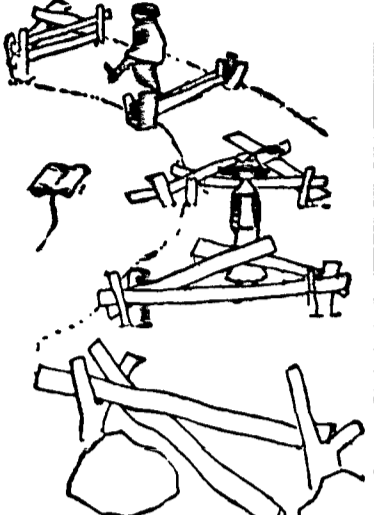

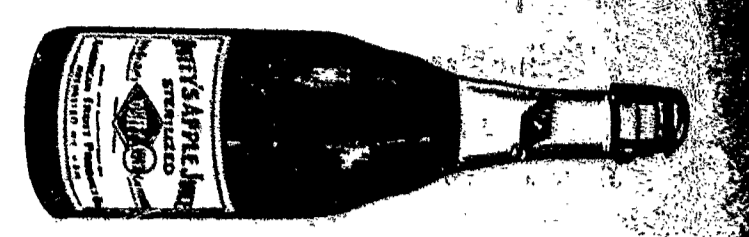

An Extra Thanksgiving. A very notable proclamation independent of the regular autumnal Thanksgiving day, though in the official records it is designated not as a proclamation, but as "the president's address to the people for thanksgiving and prayer," was McKinley's proclamation of July 6, 1898. The president addressed his words "To the People of the United States of America." He referred to the fact that "to the yet fresh remembrance of the unprecedented success which attended the operations of the United States fleet in the bay of Manila on the last day of May last are added the tidings of the no less glorious achievements of the naval and military arms of our beloved country at Santiago de Cuba" and asked the people upon next assembling for divine worship "to offer thanksgiving to Almighty God, who has watched over our cause and brought nearer the success of the right and the attainment of just and honorable peace."
