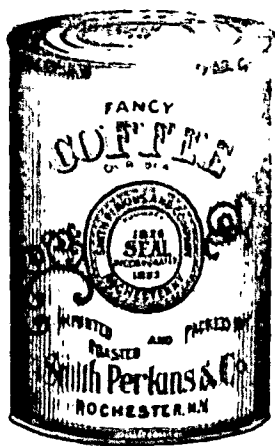

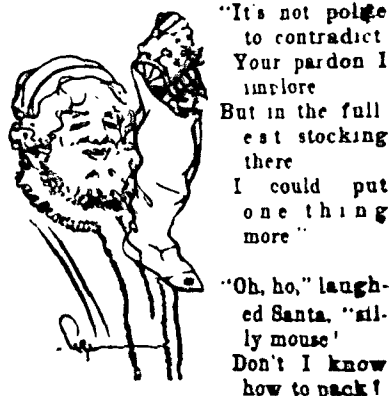

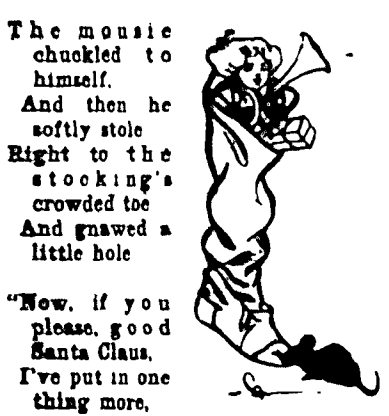
SANTA AND THE LITTLE MOUSE.

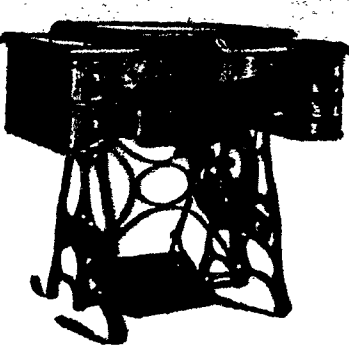

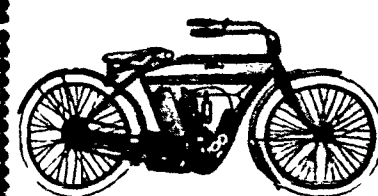
