A good disinfectant for painting bee roasts for lice and mites is made as follows.

Some poultry raisers have rid their fowls of lice by dipping the birds in a diluted stock dip.

For winter feeding clover needs cutting and steaming. Fed with grain it makes a good bulky food.

If the pigs show any signs of being "off feed" give whole or cracked oats for a day or two.

Many pigs suffer from the effects of worms in the intestines and stomach. Feed might almost as well be thrown away as given to a wormy pig.

Do not feed the pigs for about twenty-four hours and then give the dose to a few at a time or in small lots.

Experiments have shown that a cubic foot of soil from drained land is much lighter than the same amount of soil from undrained land.
