**Bishops And Priests To Hold Convention in this City.**

An important gathering of distinguished churchmen from all parts of the United States will be held in this city April 13 and 14. The occasion will be the 9th annual reunion of the Alumni Association of St. Joseph's Seminary of Troy, N.Y. It is expected that a large number of bishops, prelates and more than two hundred priests will come to Rochester for the two-day session. This will be the first year that the organization has met in this city.

The first day's session, April 13 will open with a solemn pontifical mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral, which will be celebrated by Bishop Colton of Buffalo. Following the mass, the alumni will hold a business session and elect new officers. At 1 o'clock in the afternoon a banquet will be served to the visitors in the auditorium of Cathedral Hall.
