**Rural Anecdotes.**

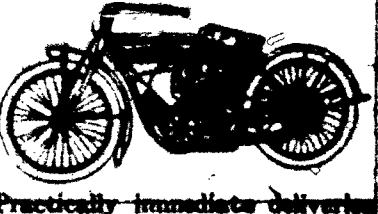
