The middle verse of the eighth verse of the One Hundred and Eighteenth Psalm. The twenty-first verse of the seventh chapter of Ezra contains all the letters of the alphabet except "i".

The nineteenth chapter of II Kings and the thirty-seventh chapter of Isaiah are alike. The first chapter to read is the twenty-sixth of the Acts of the Apostles. The longest verse is the ninth verse of the eighth chapter of Esther. The shortest verse is the thirty-fifth verse of the eleventh chapter of St. John. The eighth, fifteenth, twenty-first and thirty-first verses of Psalm One Hundred and Seven are alike. Each verse of Psalm One Hundred and Thirty-six ends alike.

There are no spaces or words of more than six syllables.
