HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Tea and Coffee Strainer With Attached Drip Bowl.



In order to catch the drip from a strainer after tea or coffee has been poured through it an inventor has provided a drip bowl which may be swung under the strainer.

Blackberry Cordial. Wash the blackberries well, put in a clean strainer on the back of the stove, let them heat thoroughly.

To Wash a Red Tablecloth. To wash properly a red tablecloth dissolve powdered borax in soft water until the water feels slippery to the hands.

Removing Mildew. To remove mildew from cloth put a teaspoonful of chloride of lime in a quart of water.

Cheddar Cheese Toast. Cheddar cheese cut in thin slices, toasted before the fire and spread on small squares of buttered toast.
