Play a Good Game. A girl once started in business a very young green and awkward specimen. But she had always played games as a boy might, and she started out to work in the same spirit.

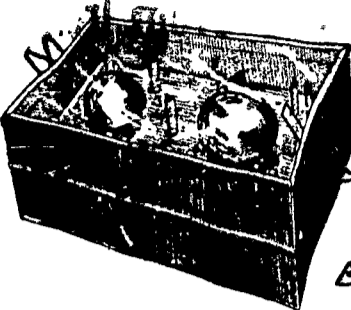
Rolling Pins. When the young housekeeper is buying a rolling pin she might as well buy a pretty one as an ugly one, especially as there is no difference in the price.

HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Fruit Steamer That Cooks From the Inside Outward.



Apples and other fruits of like nature are usually cooked from the outside in, that is, the heat cooks the outside first and gradually penetrates to the center.

Laundering Wash Goods. Black lewis, peroxide, dimitin and all scouring agents will not fade if spirits of turpentine in the proportion of one tablespoonful to each quart of water is used in rinsing.

Household Hints. Before chopping parsley wash it well, and then squeeze it dry in a cloth. When trying a large sole turn it by sticking a fork into the fish near the head.

Potato Soup. Six potatoes cooked. Mash while hot. Add one pint hot milk, onion to taste, salt and pepper, tablespoonful of butter.

Puff Pastry. Three cups of flour, three teaspoonfuls of baking powder, a little salt, and work in two tablespoonfuls of lard.

Blackberry Wine. Wash the berries and to every gallon allow three quarts of water. Cook and strain. Allow to each gallon of the mixture two and a half pounds white sugar.

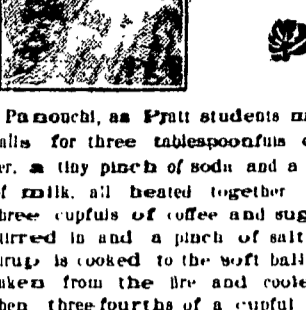
Curried Fowl. Boil a small fowl till tender, seasoning with salt and a little garlic. Stand aside to get cold, then disjoint, removing all skin.

Coffee Custard. Put one-half cup ground coffee in a little muslin bag and drop into four cups of cold milk.
