How Eskimos Measure Time.

Writing of the Eskimo methods of measuring time in a region of six months day or night, Harry Whitely in Outlook says:

Often we traveled from twenty to thirty hours without rest. Now there was no night, and I so far lost count of time that I was not at all certain of date. Our single marches with its succeeding 'sleeps' not infrequently covered a full forty-eight hours, or two ordinary days. The object of these extended marches was to take advantage of good weather and general conditions or because no safe or convenient camping place presented itself in the interim."
