Rev. Wm. E. Etzel Goes to St. Paul Institution.

Rev. Wm. Earnshaw Etzel, B. S., Litt. B., for three years professor of physics and astronomy at St. Bernard's Seminary has left Rochester for St. Paul, Minn., where he will become a member of the faculty of Archbishop Ireland's seminary.

Father Etzel was born in Rochester and educated here, but lived for many years in Europe. When the teaching orders were placed under the ban in France he came to America and was appointed a professor in the seminary by the late Bishop McQuaid. Father Etzel leaves many friends in Rochester among the clergy and laity.
