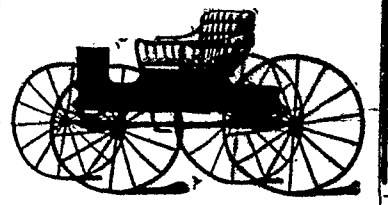
Spotted the Trick. A New York official who had gone through a political campaign, speaking of trickiness, said: "The tricky man usually winds up by being too tricky. Like Brown"
