Golden Jubilee of Fr. Miller

On Thursday, Dec. 8, Rev. F. X. Miller, C.S.S. R., who for several years has been stationed at St. Joseph's church, this city, will celebrate the golden jubilee of his profession as a member of the Redemptorist order.

Father Miller was born in New York city, Nov. 13, 1843. He received his early education at St. Alphonsus parochial school. Later he attended St. Francis Xavier College and St. Charles College, Maryland, on Dec. 8, 1860, he made his final vows and was received into the Redemptorist Order.

After his ordination to the priesthood he spent over 30 years as a missionary in a field which extended from the south to New Foundland and from Boston to Manitoba. He gained no little renown by his mission work in the coal regions during the days of the Molly McGuires.

He was no stranger in Rochester. Many of the older residents recall with pleasure his power and ability as a pulpit orator. That this power has not deserted him, even when in failing health, the present congregation cheerfully testifies. He has a host of friends who extend their best wishes.

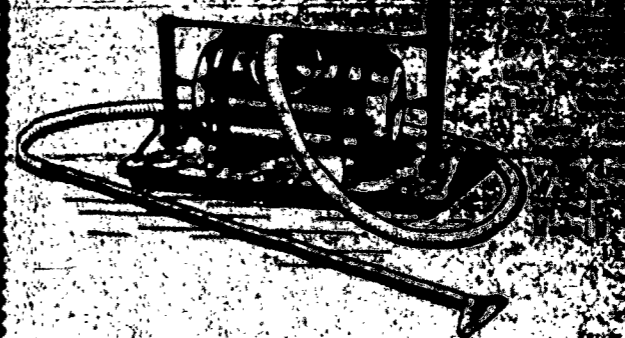
