Holmer, Who Is Going Abroad to Meet Bouchard.

Hans Holmer, who recently won the Powderhall Marathon race in Edinburgh, Scotland, will return to England in April to race against Louis Bouchard, who led in the race until the nineteenth mile. Holmer has also accepted a challenge from A. E. Wood, the ten mile champion, to run him a race at that distance.

New Kinks at Olympiad.

The program for the fifth Olympiad to be held at Stockholm, Sweden, next year has been made public. Many events unfamiliar to American athletes are on the card. New conditions, for instance, govern the javelin throw and the shot put. In addition to the free throw, there will be throws by the left and the right hands alternately. Competition will start June 30 with lawn tennis and target shooting. On July 7 the real athletic competitions will begin with the 100 meter race. Wrestling occupies a prominent place on the program, and water events vie with those of track and field. The big event of the meet, the Marathon race, will be run July 15. The distance has been made 24.85 miles instead of the regulation 26 miles 385 yards.

Big Purse at Detroit Trot Meet.

For its twenty-seventh annual blue ribbon trotting meeting, July 31 to Aug. 4, the Detroit Driving club announces four stakes to close on April 4. They are as follows: The Merchants and Manufacturers' stake, \$10,000, for 224 trotters; the Chamber of Commerce stake, \$5,000, for 218 pacers; 2.11 class, trotting, purse \$3,000; 2.04 class, pacing, purse \$3,000. The first three stakes are renewals and will be raced three in five heats, while the 2.04 is the fastest class of the year to be included in a stake list and will be two in three heats. One of the big favorites will be raced at the meeting, and with the late closing purses the total for the five days will exceed \$50,000.

Deft-His Khaki For Baseball Uniform. President Homan of the Atlanta Baseball association, has invaded the ranks of the army. He has made arrangements to buy the release of Washington Jones from the army after Jones has signed a contract to play for the Atlanta Braves. The player formerly was on the team, but quit to go into the army. After the expiration of a year enlistment, then can secure their discharge from the army by payment of \$120. Special dispensation must be obtained from the war department if the applicant for discharge has served less than a year.

Cubs Will Retain Sacrifices Hit. Despite howls and scowls, the Cubs will go right on making the sacrifice hit next summer. "The Chicago Cubs will go right along using the sacrifice hit if the pitchers are right," said manager Chance recently. He expected to see President Murphy and hold a conference. "The sacrifice play is a requisite essential when you have good pitching," said he. "When your own pitchers are bad it isn't much of a play."

McFarland Making Fortune. Packy McFarland confidently expects to harvest \$30,000 out of the fight game before the season is over. The stocky wonder has made \$12,000 already. HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Combined Baking Pan Holds Four Loaves.



A baking arrangement which combines four bread pans in one, yet bakes four separate loaves, has been designed by an Illinois man. The device consists of a rectangular metal strip large enough to inclose the tops of four pans. Along the sides are corner pieces adapted to receive the corners of the pans. As the latter are wider at the top than they are at the bottom they drop neatly into the corner pieces and stay there until pulled out by inserting some instrument under their top edges. Held together in this way, the four pans can be carried around and shoved in or drawn out of the oven as easily as one.

New England Fish Pie. For this simple but appetizing dish have a pound of cock steak boned and cut into pieces. Roll each piece in slightly salted flour and place in a buttered casserole or baking dish. Season with paprika or white pepper, then add a layer of oysters with their juice. Squeeze a tablespoonful of lemon juice over the layer and add a slight sprinkling of finely rolled crackers crumbs. Turn in a little water to moisten the mixture, dot with a few bits of butter and bake slowly for twenty minutes. Have in readiness some hot, peeled potatoes well seasoned with cream and butter and spread over the fish like a crust. Brush over with milk mixed with a little egg yolk and brown.

Meek Candied Cherries. Wash and pick over carefully one quart of some cranberry plums in a pan with one cupful of water and three cupfuls of sugar and let this boil for about five minutes. Take out the cranberries and place on a large flat dish and pour the bottled water and sugar over them. Let stand eight hours. Then place berries and syrup in a glass jar and boil until quite firm, but not until the berries break. Drain off syrup place berries on large platter on which brown paper has been spread and sprinkle with granulated sugar. When thoroughly dry pack in wooden box in layers, with paraffin paper between.

Household Helps. A piece of cloth dipped in spirits of wine and rubbed on soiled leather will remove every spot on it. A new way to cook bacon: Cut thin slices, roll in beaten egg, then in cornmeal, and fry slowly a dainty brown. Never pour hot water on japanned trays or their surface will crack and peel off. The right plan is to wash them with a little warm, soapy water, dry with a cloth and polish with a little dry soap.

Apple Ketchup. Take six large tart apples, peel, core and grind. Put on stove with a little water, boil, strain, and pour into a jar. Add one cupful sugar, one teaspoonful pepper, one of mustard, two of cinnamon and two small onions chopped very fine. Stir all together, adding a teaspoonful of salt and a pint of vinegar, and place over fire and boil one hour. Add a little water if it is too thick, bottle while hot and seal tight.

Spinach Soup. Wash thoroughly two quarts of spinach and cook in a very little boiling salted water until soft enough to rub through a colander. Add to the softening liquid a quart of milk in a double boiler and thicken with a tablespoonful of flour rubbed smooth with a tablespoonful of butter. Add the spinach, season to taste and send to the table with a spoonful of cream on each plate. Serves with crispness and noodles.

Sole Milk Pie. One cupful of very thick sour milk, one cupful of raisins, chopped fine, one cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of butter, one egg, one cracker, rolled fine, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half clove. Put on stove to thicken. Makes two pies.

Baked Bananas. Beat two egg whites, table-spoonfuls of butter into an earthenware dish, add four table-spoonfuls of sugar, two cupfuls of water and the juice of half a lemon, lay in peeled bananas and bake until tender.

To Clean a Wall. Powdered fuller's earth, sprinkled through a sieve over a light violet, left there one day and then shaken out thoroughly removes the spots.

TIMELY BREVITIES

A rich strike of iron has been made near Mount Elia. A motor whose weight is estimated at fifty tons recently fell in Mexico. An American apartment building is to be erected in the Russian city of Odessa. The military profession, the world over has the greatest percentage of suicides.
