Let no man persuade you that all Churches and creeds are alike and all working to the same common end.



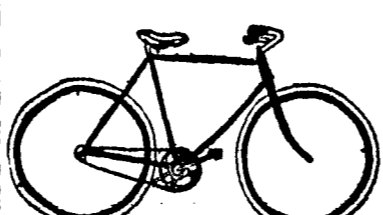
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
