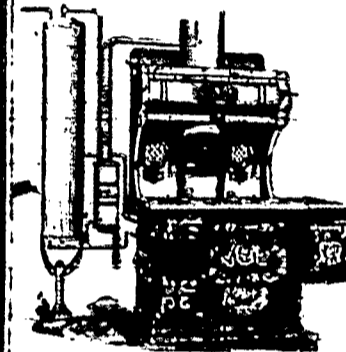

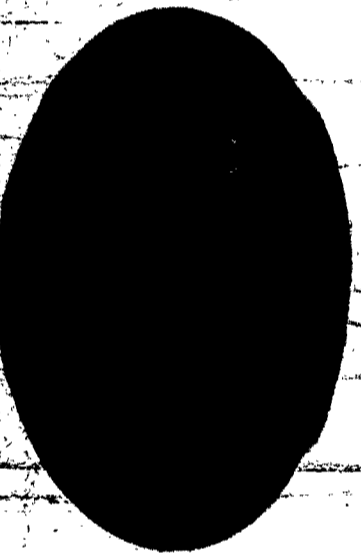

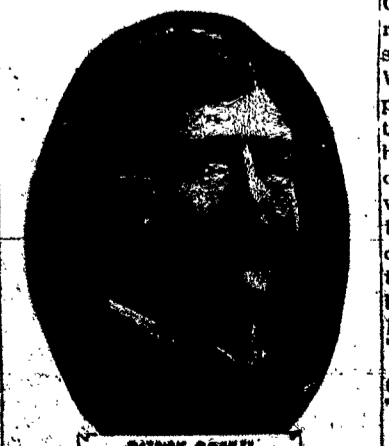
JAMES P. JONES
