A Bit of Railroad History

There is a grave in Greenwood cemetery... said an old time railroad man... the stone at the head of which bears only the name of the man whose remains are buried there... the date of his birth and the date of his death... Yet that man, John Raymond, built the first mile of railroad for commercial use and designed for locomotive power ever put down on the American continent.

That was in 1825, and that initial mile of railroad was the beginning of the Delaware and Hudson Canal company's railroad between the head of the canal at Rosendale, Pa., and the coal mines at Carbondale. And on that first mile of track the first locomotive to turn a wheel in America was run in August, 1825.

John Raymond was a native of Walton, Delaware county, N. Y., and died in Scranton, Pa., in 1888. He ought to have a place in railroad history, seems to me.—New York Sun.

Supplanting Mr. Howells

The Point of the Cape of Good Hope

The cliff scenery is wild and sublime, the rocks are magnificent and the far reaching sea, with the fierce surf beating on the iron bound coast, is impressive. In the water directly beneath the cliff sharks are abundant.
