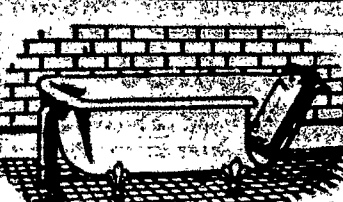

HOWS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Novel Bath Tub With Back Washing Attachment



The engraving shown here is a perspective view of a bathtub of usual construction having attached thereto a back washing accessory constructed and arranged in accordance with the invention.

Oxtail Soup.

Put into a soup-kettle and add a quart and a half of water. Boil one hour, then put in two sliced carrots, a slice of turnip, four bay leaves and a dozen cloves; salt and pepper to suit taste.

Suet Pudding. A cupful of molasses, a teaspoonful of soda, a cupful of milk, three and a half cupfuls of flour, a cupful of seeded raisins, a cupful of sugar, and a teaspoonful of salt.

Brown Bread. One cup corn meal, one cup rye meal, one cup Graham flour, two-thirds cup of molasses, one cup sour milk, one and two-thirds cups sweet milk, one teaspoon salt and one large teaspoon soda dissolved in one-third cup boiling water.

To Remove Mildew. Dissolve a heaping tablespoonful of chloride of lime in a pail of water. Dip in the goods and spread out to dry.

Coffee Tapioca. Soak three tablespoonfuls of pearl tapioca in cold water overnight. In the morning drain off the water if there is any, add three cupfuls of strong coffee, one-half cupful of sugar and a little salt.

Custard Carmelita. Take two eggs, half a cup of sugar, a cup of sweet milk, a teaspoonful of salt, a cupful of sour milk, a teaspoonful of soda, one and one-half cupfuls of cornmeal and half a cupful of flour.

Old Fashioned Rice Pudding. One quart of milk, two tablespoonfuls of rice, four tablespoonfuls of sugar, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-quarter teaspoonful of grated nutmeg will be needed for this recipe.
