The Sacred Heart Society were given a chicken supper at the school hall last Thursday evening.

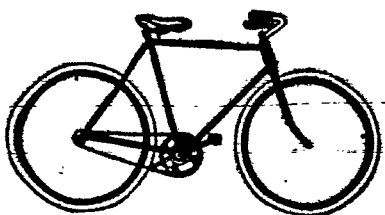
Miss Laura M. Biel of 10 Cayuga St., and Mr. Raymond J. Tierney were united in marriage in this church last Tuesday.
