### Holy Name Society

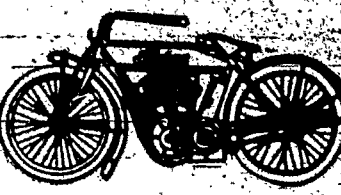
