### Immaculate Conception

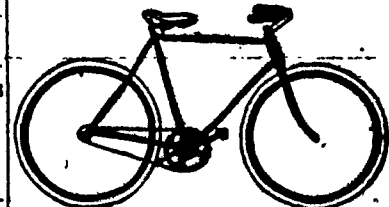
