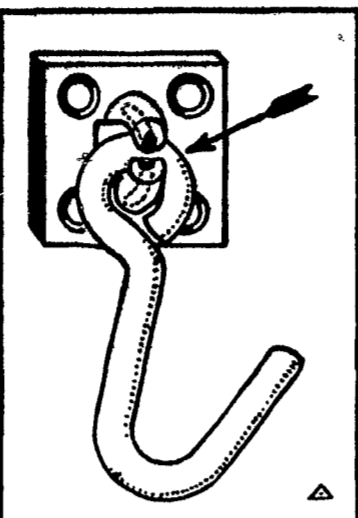

HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Noiseless Hammock Hook That is Self Lubricating.



A Georgia man has invented a hammock hook that will not squeak. In this device the inner surface of the support that holds the hook proper has a groove in it.

Berry Pudding. Beat to a cream a cupful of butter with two cupfuls of sugar. Add four well beaten eggs, a cupful of sour cream in which a teaspoonful of soda is dissolved and four cupfuls of flour.

Cold Meat Pie. Cut up about a pound of the cold meat into very small pieces and a pint of diced potatoes. Put these into a deep earthenware dish with a cupful of stock or thin gravy and salt and pepper to taste.

Washing Woolen Scarfs. Prepare soapsuds by boiling pure white soap in rainwater. Soak the article first in warm, clear water. Dip it in the soapsuds and gently knead with the hands until it appears clean.

Potatoes a la Francaise. Cut two or three slices of bacon in pieces and melt two tablespoonfuls of butter in a stewpan. Put in the bacon and fry until nearly done, adding six very small or three medium sized onions, cut in slices, and letting them cook at the same time.

Pineapple Sherbet. One can of crushed pineapple or its equivalent in fresh fruit, one and one-half pints sugar, one and one-half pints lemon juice, the juice of two lemons. Dissolve the gelatin in a little cold water then add to it a pint of boiling water.

The Clothes Props. Keeping clothes props in one place, where they can always be found in good condition on washing days, is easily accomplished by fastening two loops of stout cord or leather against the wall of the house somewhere near the laundry.

Cleaning Brass Lacquer. Brasses that are lacquered should never be touched with anything but a soft rag dampened in tepid soapy water.
