Sunday is communion day for the Rosary Society.

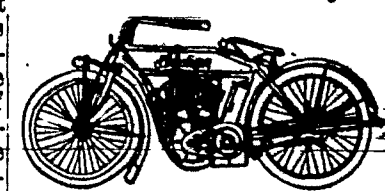
Clare O'Brien and Elizabeth Kennedy have returned from an extended vacation which was spent in the village of Bergen.
