Accurate Description. One day small Harry saw a turkey gobbler strutting around in a neighbor's back yard—the first he had ever seen.

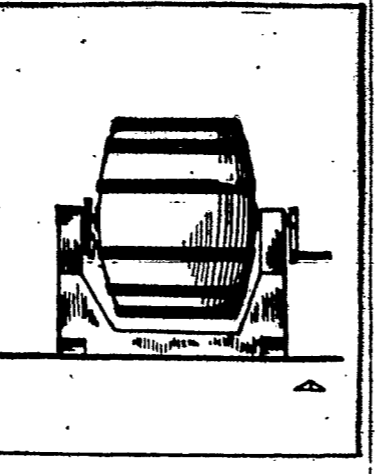

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HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Revolving Barrel Churn Equipped With Inside Paddles.



A new type of churn has been patented by an Illinois man. In this type, instead of the churn body standing still and paddles operating in it, the churn body revolves rapidly and the paddles also are active.

Rice Croquettes. Cook one-half cupful of rice with one-half cupful of boiling water in double boiler until water has been taken up into the rice.

Pai Soup. Two cupfuls of split peas, two slices of bacon, one onion, one pint of milk, salt and pepper to taste and a bay leaf.

Grapes and Rice. A very delicate dish is made of one-third of a cupful of rice, two cupfuls of grapes one-half cupful of water and two spoonfuls of sugar.

Scalloped Oysters. Take one pint of oysters, drain, strain the liquor and add enough milk to make half a pint, salt to a sea flavor and set where it will heat.

Old Fashioned Indian Pudding. Scald about ten heaping tablespoonfuls of Indian meal (cornmeal) with three pints of milk, and stir in a piece of butter (melted first), the size of a hen's egg.

Sour Milk Doughnuts. Two eggs well beaten, add one cupful of sugar, one cupful of sour milk, one teaspoonful of soda in the milk to foam.

Polishing Cut Glass. Cut glass will take a brilliant polish if washed, first, in hot soda, and then dipped into cold water in which a handful of starch has been dissolved.
