"Bishop Hanna," Now!
With all the wealth of ceremonial laid down by Holy Mother Church for such an occasion, surrounded by bishops and brother priests, with the Pope's personal representative acting as consecrator, Rev. Dr. Edward J. Hanna was raised to the bishopric on Wednesday in St. Patrick's Cathedral, where he was baptized; where his first religious instruction was received and at whose altar he has served since ordination.

Bishop Hanna is beloved of many in Rochester and, indeed, all over the country. He is as well known in Europe. He stood high in the American college. It is history that he could have been rector of the latter institution, a distinction which might have led to still higher honors than have come to him this week but he felt his first duty lay to his own diocese and to the Bishop who had been so much to him, the late Rt. Rev. Bernard J. McQuid. The day after his consecration Bishop Hanna was the central figure in a special reception tendered him by the Knights of Columbus of which organization he had been chaplain and an honored member. Other functions will but testify the general esteem in which he is held here at home and when they come to know him as we do his associates in the Pacific Coast territory will love him as we do.

"Ad multos annos, Bishop Hanna" is the Catholic Journal's last wish to the new prelate as he journeys to his far Western diocese.
