Six thousand people attended the Knights of Columbus reception to Bishop Hanna at Powers Hotel Thursday evening.

Bishop Hanna had spent the day with his sister, Mrs. Wm. T. Bassett, at No. 55 Prince St. He was escorted to the Powers Hotel by District Deputy Wm. F. Dwyer and past District Deputy Edward Gurrey. The party were met at the Fitzhugh St. entrance of the hotel by Grand Knight James P. Jones and past Grand Knight, J. Henry Howe, Edward McSweeney, Dr. James T. McGovern, Frank J. Hughes, Thomas E. Garvey and Wm. J. Carey.

While the long line was winding its way in and out of the hotel the Brahm's Glee Club, directed by Professor Eugene F. Bonn organist and director of the choir at St. Patrick's Cathedral, sang, and an orchestra played.
