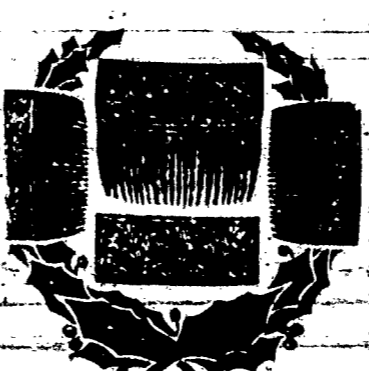
IN MEMORIAM
