### Organization

This is an age of organization and of printer's ink. Nothing can be started, nothing can be promoted, nothing can be brought to definite conclusion without organization. And the constant corollary to organization is the dissemination of the organization's intention through the public press. Half the space in the issues of the papers is devoted to doings of organizations which are interesting but not always in the strict sense of the word, news.

It must be that the readers of these papers want to read this sort of matter, else the papers would not print it because newspapers are not run as eleemosynary institutions but as a source of financial profit to their proprietors.

This being so, we Catholics are behind the times if we do not keep our activities before the public at large. Our own people like to see Catholic activities and Catholics as individuals mentioned in the papers. It shows we are in the forefront and it gives a sort of pride to a weak-kneed Catholic and imbues him with courage to stand up for his faith.

And there is no better vehicle of publicity than a Catholic paper. Besides, it is a tower of strength in supporting the Church. A strong Catholic press means a strong Catholic laity in a locality. And a strong Catholic press cannot be maintained without resources. It must have a large advertising clientele. This cannot be had without a large subscription list. Hence, Catholics should subscribe for their Catholic paper and help it to secure a large advertising patronage. And then Catholics should patronize the merchants who advertise in their Catholic paper. That is what the advertisers advertise for. And that is what other organizations do for their supporters.

### Charity

Charity is a divine attribute which we humans should possess in as large a measure as possible as it embraces the qualities which go to make up a world pleasant to live in. If we have not charity for our fellow men how can we expect them to have love for us? We do not care? Not so. There is no living being who does not desire to have the love of some of his fellows, no matter how hard-hearted he may wish to be understood.

If there were no charity in the world, what an unsatisfactory place it would be, to be sure! If the world could be run on the cold-blooded plane that some persons would have it, and these are not the captains of high finance, either, this world would be monotonous.

And charity, as the Catholic knows, covers more than mere almsgiving to a fellow-human in distress. It is said and well said that charity covereth a multitude of sins. To be charitable means that we are to overlook our bro-

ther's faults, that we must be forgiving, that we are to help our brother in word and deed, in short, he who possesses charity in his soul, comes mighty near to a perfect man.

Let us emulate the Divine Master's definition of charity and then we will be happier in this world and also will be laying up treasures for the world to come.

### Gratitude

One of the virtues too often noticed because it is lacking, is that of gratitude. When one seeks a favor and it is granted, common decency should impel gratitude and a firm resolve to reciprocate whenever and wherever opportunity offers. But how often is gratitude only skin deep, as it were, only the idle fancy of the passing moment. As soon as the favor has been granted, almost, it is forgotten. And if gratitude is felt for a while it soon fades from memory.

Some of the old-time politicians maintained their power because they possessed and always lived up to this trait of gratitude.

Sometimes, to be sure, they returned their gratitude out of the public treasury in the shape of an easy job with a fat salary to the one from whom they had received the favor, or a nice contract was handed out with the assurance that rigid inspection is not on the cards. This is very wrong, to be sure but these politicians exhibit more of the virtue than some of those who criticize the politician the most severely.
