Dongan de Peyster, New York has been baptized and received into the church by the Rev. J. F. X. O'Connor, S. J., at St. Francis Xavier church.

Miss Elinor Douglas Wise, a convert, will marry the Duke de Richelieu, in the Baltimore Cathedral, February 8th. His Eminence Cardinal Gibbons officiating.

Cardinal O'Connell has written and also personally set to music a "Hymn to the Holy Name." It was sung for the first time at the Christmas midnight mass, Boston Cathedral.

Dudley Field Malone, son-in-law of Senator O'Gorman, of New York, has been tendered and has accepted the post of secretary to President-elect Wilson. He will assume the duties of this position after March 4.

Archbishop Quigley of Chicago has become chancellor of De Paul University, that city.
