The incorporators were Rev. Dr. William A. Fletcher, Rev. Dr. C. F. Thomas, James R. Wheeler, Thomas Foley Hisky and Paul J. Prodoehl.

Besides the incorporators, the following will be members of the board of governors: Mgr. George W. Devine, Rev. James F. Donohue, Rev. M. F. Foley and Rev. Joseph R. Wisel. Father Foley will be secretary of the company and Father Thomas will be editor-in-chief of the paper.
