Trinity Hospital, Milwaukee, has passed under the control of Marquette University.

It transpires that Father Malachy Hynes, a Capuchin, of Oregon, had his passage engaged on the ill-fated steamer "Titanic," and at the last moment changed it to permit him to take part in a Home Rule celebration in Dublin on the sailing day of the "Titanic."

Rt. Rev. Mgr. Jerome M. Cloare of Burlington, Vt., is just entering his fifty-fifth year as a priest. He is in his eightieth year. He is a native of St. Sauveur, France.

Sister Mary Agnes, of Baltimore, has been appointed Provincial of the Sisters of Notre Dame, by the Mother-General in Munich, by cable. She will reside at Milwaukee.

Miss Nannie Gibson, daughter of Capt. Samuel Gibson, U. S. Navy, has entered the Visitation Order as Sister Mary Magdalen.

The Church is prospering in Mobile, Ala. Work on a new St. Matthew Church and on a new building of the Little Sisters of the Poor has begun there.

The Bishop of Davenport, Ia., Mgr. Davis, ordained Rev. Martin O'Connell, a descendant of the Irish Emancipator, Daniel O'Connell.

Three Cincinnati priests, Rev. Dr. Shea, of Mt. St. Mary's Seminary, Rev. James Moore, and Rev. M. L. Loney, have gone on an eight month's journey to Europe and the Holy Land.

In the past year, fourteen Anglican clergymen at home and abroad, and six Anglican students, have entered the Catholic Church.

A magnificent Carrara marble altar, valued at \$3,000 and donated to St. Patrick's Church, Fort Wayne, Ind., by Miss Elizabeth DeWald, is in process of erection.

According to Rev. Dr. Austin Kennedy De Bois, three-fourths of the wealthy families of Boston are childless.

The Catholic Order of Foresters has contributed \$5,606.25 to St. Thomas College, St. Paul, Minn., as endowment fund.

It will interest Catholics to know, says the "Catholic Citizen" that Mr. Alexis I. du Pont Coleman formerly rector of St. Michael's Episcopal church, Wilmington, Del., and a convert to the Church in 1896, is now a professor in the College of the city of New York and head of the Newman Catholic Club of that institution. Dr. Coleman is a son of the late Episcopalian Bishop of Delaware and a graduate of Keble College, Oxford.

On the feast of the Epiphany, the Holy Father granted audience to 190 German artisans.

The Prime Minister of Bavaria, on behalf of the new Prince Regent, has conferred on the Papal Nuncio at Munich the Grand Cross of the Order of the Crown.

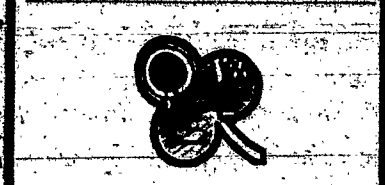
The new court house in Rome, which has been estimated to cost \$1,200,000, has already cost \$3,000,000. It is considered in governmental Rome a great scandal.
