Mr. and Mrs. Tobin of Garson Ave. entertained friends Sunday evening. Victrola selections were enjoyed.

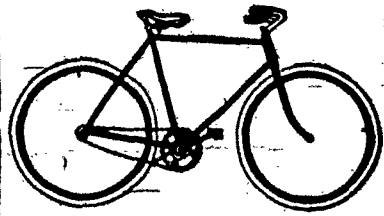
**Nazareth Alumni Dinner**

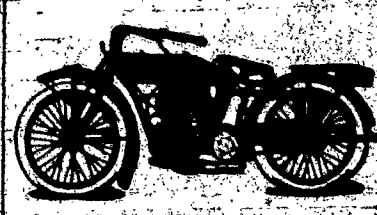

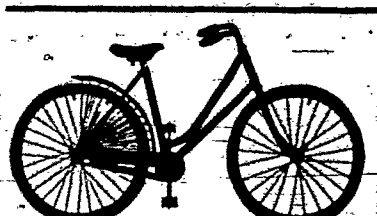

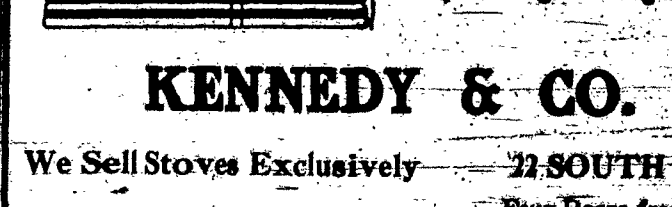
