Joachim Miller and New York. Tuskless Elephants. It is a singular thing that Ceylon is the only part of the world where the male elephants have no tusks. They have miserable little grinders projecting two or three inches from the upper jaw and inclining downward. Nothing produces either ivory or horn in the elephants throughout Ceylon. Although some of the buffaloes have tolerably fine horns, they will not bear a comparison with those of other countries. The horns of the native cattle are not above four inches in length. The elk and the spotted deer's antlers are small compared with deer of their size in India. This is the more singular as it is evident from the geological formation that at some remote period Ceylon was not an island, but formed a portion of the mainland. It is thought that there must be elements wanting in the Ceylon pasturage for the formation of ivory.
