Auburn Council, No. 207, K. of C. are making great preparations to entertain the delegates to the State convention to be held in that city June 9, 10, 11.

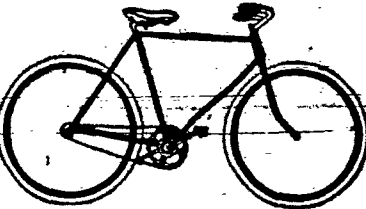
The May party held by Rochester Council Wednesday evening was attended by an assemblage that filled the rooms. Dancing and pedro were enjoyed and refreshments were served.

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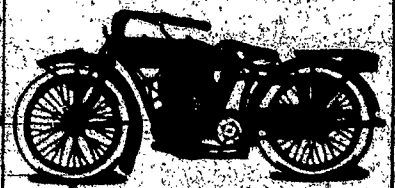
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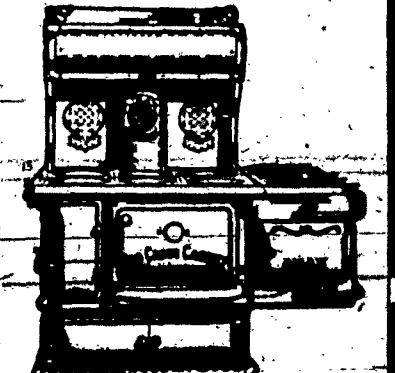
