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**The Way To Do It**

We are watching with interest for a reply to a right tart and right to the point letter sent to the Tabbard Inn Book Company, a concern that supplies traveling circulating libraries with books and also operates a few libraries of its own.

It appears this Tabbard Inn company sends out a catalogue of its publications and that a recent catalogue contained a fulsome and eulogistic review of Father Chiniqui's scurrilous book on the confessional. It also happened that one of these catalogues was mailed to the library of St. Mary's College, North East, Pa. The good Redemptorist Librarian was not only angry but he was moved to action.

The reverend librarian at once indited a vigorous epistle to the Tabbard Inn company of which the following are extracts:—

Now, we cannot understand how a respectable firm can publish such a scurrilous book without making itself a partner to the offense, and besmirching its good name! Now, please take notice of the following: If you send us henceforth any catalogues, advertisements, etc., they shall go into the waste basket unnoticed. Besides, this letter, with explanations of the case of F. Chiniqui, will be sent to the Catholic papers!

You cannot make yourselves partners of an insult to the Catholics of the United States and escape justly deserved punishment.

If every Catholic institution, following morning, the visitors every individual Catholic will follow suit, this and other publishing houses will go light on such books in the future because they like Catholic money.

**Dissertation on Lies**

The successor to Brann as editor of "The Iconoclast" is no mean phrase maker or verbal architect. Just read over this dissertation on "Lies" as inspired by recent attacks upon the Catholic Church, the Catholic faith and upon individual Catholics:—

**Dr. Abbot Right**

Dr. Lyman Abbott has been dropped from the membership roll of the American Peace Society because he believes in attaining peace through strength rather than through weakness. After reading the following explanation by Dr. Abbott of his position, we believe that the majority of the American people will agree with the Doctor:—

"Some men think the way to maintain peace is for nations to disarm and after that settle their international differences through a judicial tribunal. Others think the practical way is to go before the tribunal first, and when peace has been established, resort to disarmament. I agree with the latter theory.

"There are two ways in which the nations can work for peace, either by being so weak that they cannot fight or being so strong that they need not fight. I believe in our own nation being so strong that she will not need to fight.

"My idea is that the navy should be strong enough to protect our citizens everywhere. We ought to take our full part in the international life of the world. I believe that if we are strong in our fighting facilities and then are just as patient and considerate of other peoples, we would do a great deal more for peace than if we cut down our navy and came to be regarded by the other nations as unable to defend ourselves and unable to share with them in the work of maintaining peace and order in the world at large."

**Tenth Annual Session**

Meetings of the National Catholic Educational Association are becoming of more than passing importance not only to the Catholic public but to the entire American public. The annual convention of the association for 1913 will be the tenth and will be held in New Orleans from June 30 to July 3rd. The programme outlined gives some idea of the scope and extent of the discussions. On the opening evening a reception will be tendered to the delegates and visitors by the Catholics of New Orleans. The following morning the visitors will attend high mass at the Cathedral and will be addressed by Archbishop Blenk. The convention will then formally open in Loyola University. In the afternoon the various departments will begin sessions. These include: College department, deaf mute section, superintendents' section, provincials and superiors of religious communities of women, seminary department, parish school department, high school department.

Catholic educators of all parts of the country will take part either in the discussions or as authors of papers and addresses. The subjects cover all there is in the realm of education, that is in the popular sense. There is no more important work to-day than that of the educator and, especially, that of the Catholic educator as the latter truly trains the mind and heart of the children and of the young men and women. May the session of 1913 be a most profitable one!

June days, so far, have justified expectation. Governor's wives, not infrequently, are the real power behind the throne.

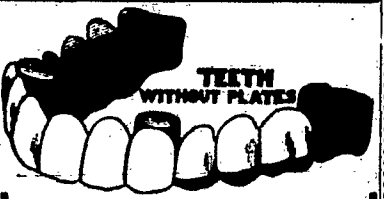
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
