Catholic News Notes

St. Peter's parish at Jersey City has a \$55,000 club house for its young men and boys.

Notre Dame Academy, at Mitchell, diocese of Sioux Falls, has been completed at a cost of \$75,000.

A retreat for women will open in St. Joseph's Academy, St. Paul, Minn., beginning June 7th and ending on the 11th; it will be conducted by Magr. Carroll, Bishop of Helena.

In Buffalo, N. Y., the building of a new \$50,000 St. Monica church has begun.

At Norwood, near Cincinnati, the St. Elizabeth parish will erect the largest school building in the Archdiocese at a cost of \$75,000.

The new rectory for the priests of St. Brigid's Church, Brooklyn, will be ready for occupancy this month. It cost \$40,000 and is free from debt.

The Very Rev. Passionist, Father Paul Joseph Nussbaum, was consecrated Bishop of the new Texas diocese of Corpus Christi, last Tuesday, by the Apostolic Delegate, Msgr. Bonzano, assisted by the Bishops of Brooklyn and Newark.

The Archdiocesan Home for Orphan Boys at Beaverton, Ore., has been enlarged by the erection of a new three-story wing containing schoolrooms and a chapel.

The late Rev. J. L. Hoey, pastor of the Church of St. Francis de Sales, N. Y., paid off during his pastorate of that Church \$100,000 on the parish debt. Mr. Lewis now succeeds him; he is the youngest pastor in New York.

The Little Sisters of the Poor now number 5,793. They care for 45,913 old people in 306 Homes throughout the world—even in Oceania.

St. Casimer's church on Child street, Warren, R. I., was practically ruined by fire May-1, with a loss of about \$18,000.

The first Church in Fort Smith Ark., was built in 1845, by Vicar General Corry.

Rev. Martin Augustine Waldron, O. P., Master of S. Theology, has been appointed prior of the Dominican House of Studies at Washington.

The new school of St. Catherine of Alexandria in Fort Hamilton avenue, Brooklyn, is rapidly nearing completion. The Madames of the Sacred Heart will have charge.

Rev. Father Ma Shen Fu, a highly educated young Chinese Catholic priest, has been appointed Secretary to the President of the Chinese Republic.

Military Field Mass

A military field Mass will be celebrated in Rockefeller Park, Cleveland, Ohio, on Sunday, June 25, under the auspices of the First Brigade of Ohio Knights of St. John. It is expected that 50,000 people will attend. The Bishop of Cleveland has been invited to provide, and a large number of priests will assist at the solemn and beautiful services.

A Good Idea

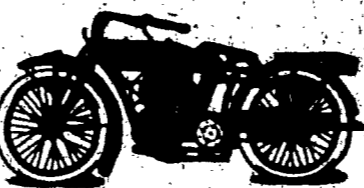
