School Opens September 2nd

The opening of the Catholic high schools, academies and parochial schools of the diocese will open on September 2d, on which day registration will take place. The Cathedral High School, Nazareth Academy, Sacred Heart Academy, Nazareth Hall and the various parish schools expect an increased attendance over last year and are preparing for such needs. St. Lucy's school will open for the first time and will care for the Italian children in the neighborhood of West avenue.

Extensive improvements have been made in both departments of the Cathedral school, at which a registration of more than four hundred in the high-school department is expected. The school will be open for inspection and for registration of pupils on Sunday, August 31st. The courses to be followed are the same as last year and are based on the syllabus of the New York State Education Department, and are preparatory for professional and business life.

In the academic department there are the classical, Latin scientific and normal entrance courses. In the intermediate the course is a combined academic and commercial one. In the business department there is a book-keeping course for boys and a shorthand course for girls, of two years each. The priests of the Cathedral and Sisters of St. Joseph make up the faculty, which has been supplemented for the past several years by young women graduates of St. Elizabeth's College.

The grammar school course is uniform one of eight years, with uniform examinations, supplementing the regents.

Ever since 1907 there has been a steady yearly increase in the value of the gold output of the Klondike region, the figures for 1912 being \$5,225,280.

"Widows' Town," as the Berlin suburb of Charlottenburg is popularly known, is officially stated to contain 14,542 widows and only 2,368 widowers.

Using an electrical furnace, a London scientist has succeeded in drawing glass tubes with an outside diameter of but one-twenty-five thousandths of an inch.

Discovered recently in Snohomish county, Washington, is a 300 foot high yellow fir which is said to eclipse all previous records of big trees in the northwest.

For frightening burglars there has been invented a flashlight that resembles a magazine pistol, but which shoots a ray of light when the trigger is pulled.

While Spain has plenty of government agricultural schools and farms, the large land owners and farmers seem to prefer to carry on operations in the old way.

An abattoir in Dublin is planned by the Irish Meat and Transit society, which will also construct special boats to ply between London and Dublin for carrying meat.

New Zealand cattle raisers have found that the meat of dressed calves retains its flavor better when exported long distances if the skins be left on until ready for market.

A new English mine rescue apparatus goes away with the helmet and weighs only twenty-eight pounds, yet with it a man can work in deadly gases more than fifty hours.

A new power unit, known as the myriawatt, has been favored in place of the boiler horse power unit by committees of American societies of electrical and mechanical engineers.

The violoncello by Giovanni Granadio, used throughout all his tours by the late Auguste Van Blie in "The Broken Melody," has just been sold in a London auction room for £85.

The Italian postmaster general has been instrumental in raising the marriage ban placed on telephone girls in Italy. As a result he has been invited to act as best man at 800 unions.

In the opinion of an English scientist, the wear of macadam roads is not due to the suction of automobile tires, but almost entirely to the crushing effect of horseshoes and iron tread wheels.

A rabbit cannal factory has been started in Argentina, the time being exported. The fur of the animals are sold to an Argentine hat factory. Rabbits have become a pest in Buenos Aires province.

In making a study of grazing lands on the national forests, 125 entirely new species of plants have been discovered by the government's experts, and will be named and classified by the botanists of the department of agriculture.

If an English engineer's plan to run an electric railroad up the side of Mount Popocatepetl, in Mexico, be carried out, passengers will experience a change in temperature from 70 degrees above zero to 10 below within two hours.

A fleet of vessels is largely employed in the banana carrying trade of the Atlantic ports. Not much more than a generation ago Captain L. D. Baker of Boston ventured to bring the first lot of bananas to this country. The value of the importations annually is now \$14,000,000.

Kettlewell, in Yorkshire, possesses the most remarkable electric lighting installation in England.—The village is only a tiny place, but the river Wharfe provides it with natural water power, and at a cost of less than £600 a lighting plant has been erected, the villagers being the shareholders and directors of the company.

The clock in the facade of St. Lazare station is to be the first in Paris to have the newly adopted official numerals of 13 to 24 for the hours after noon. From 1 a. m. till 12 the figures 1 to 12 will appear on the dial. As noon strikes they will disappear, and by an automatic arrangement the figures 13 to 24 will take their places.

A petrified man was sold by auction in Paris recently.—The man lived some thousands of years ago in Patagonia. He was about six feet three inches in height. Though he is now a stone statue, the body bears traces of two deep wounds. It is supposed that the man was killed and that his body was slowly changed to stone by the action of water charged with lime salts.
