Bishop Denounces Immodest Dress

In a speech Wednesday evening to the Ladies Catholic Benevolent Association in Cathedral Hall, Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey denounced the mode of dress of the women of to-day. After congratulating the members on their successful work in the past, and the wonderful growth of the organization, Bishop Hickey said: "I appeal to the women of the L. C. B. A. to temper, criticize and put a stop to the immodest dress of the women. If others desire to come down from the pedestal which has been theirs in the past let the L. C. B. A., women stand firm. It is your duty as women and as mothers to hold sacred the ideals of motherhood and womanhood above everything. Do not be swayed by fashion, but continue in the path in which you have won the respect of men—and hold that respect. By holding and adhering to these sacred costumes of the past, you will gain power and be able to rule. In ruling you will be able to govern the world. You owe it to yourself as women, to your children as mothers and to Catholicity as members of the church."

Cathedral Hall was decorated for the occasion and one of the largest crowds that has ever been to such a gathering was present. Mrs. Cora McParlin, supreme trustee, spoke to the members as did Dr. Katherine L. Daly, supreme medical examiner, Mrs. Anna Weber and Mrs. Mary Huebner. A musical programme was enjoyed.
