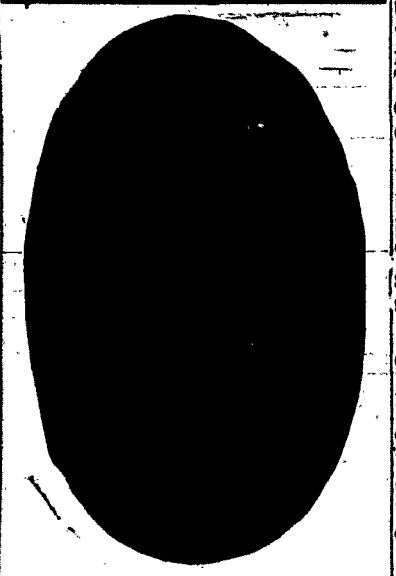

Many Work For Jahmarkt

Besides the General Committee and subcommittees in charge of the Deutscher Jahmarkt, to open at Exposition Park next Wednesday night, there is not only active work on the plans and arrangements the large committee of the Ladies Aid, but each of the dozen German societies that are interested in this movement to raise funds for the German hall has an active committee at work. Each of these societies will have one or more booths, and the rivalry among them as to which shall be the most attractive is becoming keen.

Interest in this educational and instructive amusement enterprise has been aroused in the towns of the vicinity, and the Committee on arrangements has received word that a large party of the Canandaigua Academy pupils will visit the park one night.

To obtain articles with which to stock the many booths, which will be in charge of village maidens dressed in medieval costume, "showers" are being held by the members of the Ladies' Aid.

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Holy Name Societies to Parade Sunday

At a meeting of the priests of the city and vicinity Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the chancery office, 70 Frank St., final arrangements were made and all details settled for the annual demonstration of the Holy Name Societies, to take place Sunday afternoon.

This will be the fourth public demonstration, and besides the societies representing the 28 Catholic churches in the city, several from the surrounding towns will be in line. The marshal of the parade, Colonel Frank J. Schwab, will be assisted by aides and the entire body will be divided into four divisions, with eight men abreast forming the line. The men will form in their respective parishes in time to march to Main St., East and East Ave., where the line of march will be formed promptly at 3 o'clock. The societies will form in the order of the seniority of the parishes. The line of march will be through Main street East and West to St. Mary's Orphan Asylum grounds, where the men will listen to an address by Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, and assist at solemn benediction of the blessed sacrament.

A platform and altar will be erected in the rear of the asylum building, and there the benediction will be given and the address delivered. The benediction hymns will be sung by the great concourse of men, under the direction of Professor Eugene Bonn of the Cathedral. The congregational singing of the men and also special selections by individual choirs at one or two points along the line of march will be the features of this year's parade.

There will be uniformity of dress and insignia on the part of the men, each society having at its head a banner of the Holy Name and an American flag, and every member, besides wearing his button, will carry a pennant with the letters "H. N. S." inscribed upon it. The pastors and assistant priests will march with the men.

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
