Diocese To Establish Two High Schools

One of the most important movements along educational lines in Rochester, which is to be a reality in the immediate future, is the development, and at the same time centralizing, of the Roman Catholic High School system for the parochial schools of Rochester, now 26 in number. The necessity and desirability of expanding high school accommodations to keep pace with the growth of the city, and at the same time, of establishing two central high schools, one for boys and one for girls, has been practically decided upon by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, and the pastors of the Catholic churches of the city.

The late Miss Barry, of Washington, founded a \$10,000 scholarship in the Catholic University.

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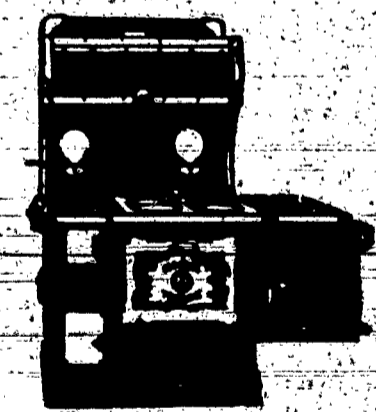
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
