Great Care Needed

While there are many earnest and well-meaning citizens who honestly believe that much knowledge will automatically eliminate vice and immorality, we cannot concede that this is true but granted that it is so, is it the wisest course to impart such knowledge to mixed assemblages of young boys and girls?

Catholics in Office

While Catholic governors are no rarity in the Western States, the conservative East has not taken so kindly to the possibility. In very truth, some of the strongest objections of the nomination of Catholics for high positions have emanated from Catholic partisans who feared that the Catholic nominee would be defeated and so spell defeat for the party in general. It is no secret that Martin H. Glynn was a leading candidate in Syracuse last fall but was set aside by fearful and weak-kneed Catholic democrats.

However, the conservative East is changing round. A few years ago Rhode Island set the example by electing a Catholic governor. This year Massachusetts elected its first Catholic

And the best of it all is that all these were chosen by vote of the people. Running for lieutenant-governor last year. Governor Glynn led Mr. Sulzer by several thousand votes. The bigots cannot raise any valid objection except that the people are not to be trusted.

Again we say: If Catholic citizens are exemplary citizens, their non-Catholic fellow will not blacklist them, at least the fair-minded non-Catholics will not.
