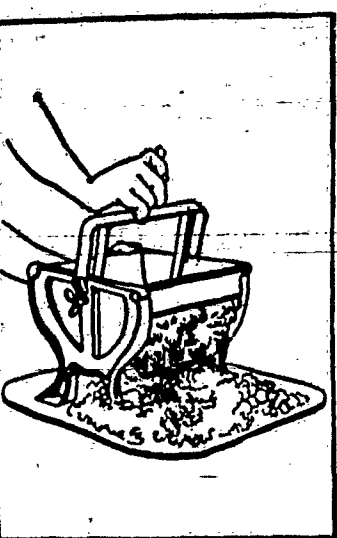
A French firm is offering to the owners of woods cast iron cylinders to put around all their young trees to protect them against hungry cattle.

Pancho Villa, Leader of Mexican Constitutionalists.

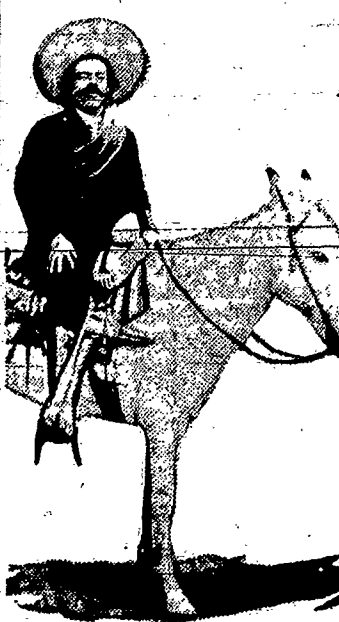
