Rev. Daniel Quigley to be assistant to Rev. M. Dwyer at Seneca Falls.

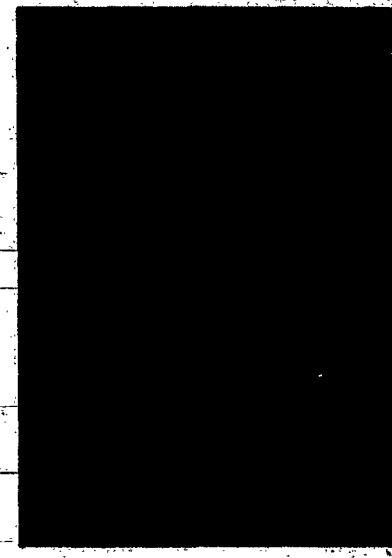
The Archbishop of Cincinnati has adopted a new plan or method for the support of the Diocesan Orphan Asylum, to insure the Orphanage a permanent and sufficient means of annual maintenance. He has fixed a stated proportionate amount for each parish, which the parish will voluntarily assume to contribute annually.

The manage of St. Vincent's Sanitarium, Sherman, Texas, celebrated the tenth anniversary of that institution on January 6, by the opening of a free clinic afternoons from one o'clock to three, all poor will be treated free of charge.

The Sisters of Providence have on their property, St. Mary in the Woods, Ind., a coal mine with capacity of sixty tons a day. A shaft 270 feet leads to it. It is five feet. They manage the mine.

At Siloe, close by Jerusalem, is a colony of lepers. The Sisters attend them, and are endeavoring to build a hospital for them—19 in all.

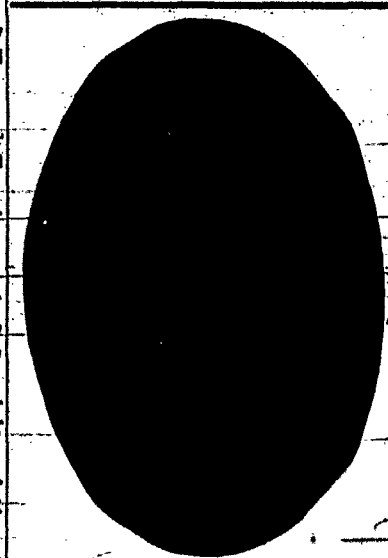
