The church will be of stone and pressed brick and will be 56 by 169 feet in dimensions. The style of architecture will be Lombard Romanesque of the thirteenth century. The stained glass for the windows will come from Munich and Tiffany of New York city will design the altar furnishings.

The planning architects for the church are Comes & Kauror of Pittsburg and the supervising architect is Charles W. Eldridge of this city.

When the new structure is completed, the present church will be devoted entirely to school purposes.
